How I Can Learn Time

- This is state choir day, so they were not able to attend. They will present in June.

Lisa Last, Local Youth Survey Results

- Lisa shared data from the Kansas Communities That Care (KCTC) survey (grades 6, 8, 10, 12)
 - Families do have to opt in to take this survey during enrollment (it used to be that they had to opt out, so numbers are a bit down)
 - Still, we had 83% student participation this year.
 - Data looks good and progress has been made, especially in the substance abuse areas.
 - Alcohol usage went from 7.6 to 2.5 percent
 - Numbers went up in student safety concerns and is being addressed. This is higher than the state average.
 - Bullying reports have gone up slightly this year as well.
 - Concerns about hurting yourself data was higher than the state average in both 6/8 and 10/12.
 - Parent model questions is not asked on the survey.
 - This is the data that Clay Counts Coalition uses to receive their grants, so students taking the survey is really important.
- Jaclyn said Bully Prevention might be a good option for Clay Counts to look into speakers, programs, etc. moving forward based on the data.
 - Audrey asked if we should be looking into middle school options more than high school based on the data.

Tracy Myers, Clay Counts

- June 6 is "Night in June" to help families get back on Medicaid
 - Possible because of a grant. A free meal will be provided and games/prizes will be available as well.
 - Goal is to get information out to families for services that can help with this (includes parents, grandparents, kids, guardians, etc.).
 - Lisa and USD 379 nurses will be in attendance to help. Head Start will be in attendance as well.
 - Tracy will send information to the district to send out to parents.

Why is alcohol awareness month important?

Alcohol addiction and abuse is not only a considerable burden on government spending, it also claims thousands of lives across the country each year. Some notable statistics on alcohol addiction include:

- More than 65 million Americans report binge or heavy drinking in a one-month period, which is more than 40% of those who drink alcohol
- Last year, there were 10,511 alcohol-impaired driving fatalities, totaling 29% of all traffic fatalities.
- Teen alcohol use kills 4,700 people each year, more than all illegal drugs combined.

- Blessing Box Project: Alessia Corrales and Heather Tremblay
 - Blessing boxes are actually lending libraries, so there are fewer around than we thought.
 - i. These were built by the CC Rotary club, but it is up to the individual organization to keep them up to date.
 - Most of the boxes are empty, and they are not registered with the organization.
 - Heather is going to work on moving these over to become actual Blessing Boxes, at least during certain times of the year.
 - *i.* This starts with her contacting organizations in charge of each box.
 - This would cost approximately \$75 per box each time they are refilled, so this cost would need to be addressed.
 - Heather provided a map of current boxes that are in and around town.
 - Clay Counts agreed to move forward to help with this project. There were no objections from the coalition.
